In addition, all your tasks and changes are synced to your Wunderlist account on the web, so you don't have to sync or push changes to another device. In addition, you can share to-dos with other users and collaborate on projects. Another tool, Epistle (Free), works in a similar way. Most other Android managers are in the department for free with paid add-ons or freemium departments. ReQall (Free) has a great Android app that syncs with the ReQall web app, but syncing is often buggy and its best features such as integration with Evernote and Google Calendar, SMS reminders and location awareness are only available to subscribers for \$19.99/year ReQall Pro.
